YOUR SUPPORT MADE A DIFFERENCE TO 67,339 OF OUR NEIGHBORS, FRIENDS, AND FAMILY.

Your support has provided assistance to improve youth opportunity, financial security, and promote a healthy community, impacting lives in immeasurable ways.

You made a difference:

- 495 community members who experienced domestic violence received support and counseling services to better their lives.
- 106 youth worked towards earning high school credits, obtained valuable credentials for the workforce, with 19 securing employment.
- 253 children are now reading at grade level.
- **130 individuals** with chronic disease gained access to essential healthcare.
- **103 children** received access to therapy services.
- 666 snack packs were distributed to elementary children during winter break.
- 213 books were distributed to our youngest community members encouraging a life of reading.



Health: A Basic Building Block for a Good Life

Through a grant from Global Giving, United Way assisted with the medical and wellness needs of **over 12,000** individuals. Together with our many community partners we were able to provide humanitarian assistance to those who needed medical care, over the counter medicines, wound care and prescription drugs.

Last year United Way launched a pilot program with the University of Texas Health Science Center's Salud Y Vida program to improve access to health services, monitor chronic disease and provide self-management educational programming to uninsured individuals with no medical home through a mobile medical unit. Thirty-three individuals received services and worked to improve their overall health outcomes and reduce the occurrence of chronic disease. This opportunity was funded through a grant from United Way Worldwide and the Johnson and Johnson Foundation.

VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE (VITA)

The VITA project helps working families access the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) which is the federal government's largest anti-poverty initiative. Since 2004, United Way has partnered with schools and community organizations to train and support over hundreds of volunteers across the county to provide working families with free tax preparation and e-filing. **151 individuals** were trained and certified as tax preparers, high school students earned this valuable credential as well as hands on work experience.

United Way became a certified acceptance agent for the IRS last year and to date we helped more than **38 individuals file for ITINs**.

This year the team prepared **4,758 tax returns** and brought back **\$3,572607 million in EITC**. This is money that goes directly into the pockets of working families, making VITA an effective community economic development strategy and moving families closer to financial security.
